They have found their way into the present age as reactionary conformity that manages to discredit any notion of feminine specificity or freedom that is not based on seduction-which means not based on reproduction and consumption (Kristeva). The intertextual approach to Kristeva and Woolf brings to light matricide as the silent engine behind the stammering of female temporality.
