Als politische Akteure besaßen die Amerikaner bis zum Dezember 1941 einen festen Platz in der NS-Polykratie: Bei großen politischen Aktionen der Nationalsozialisten waren sie vorab informiert, bei vielen Medienereignissen waren sie Schlüsselpersonen. Die Studie enthüllt zahlreiche Staats- und Weltkriegsgeheimnisse, welche die transatlantischen und globalen Beziehungen in jener Epoche in neuem Licht erscheinen lassen. Die US-Medien blieben auch zwischen 1942 und 1945 beim Kriegsgegner präsent: Associated Press (AP), die bis heute größte Nachrichtenagentur der Welt, kooperierte mit dem nationalsozialistischen Regime während des gesamten Zweiten Weltkrieges. Dies kann auch die Ignoranz der amerikanischen Medien gegenüber dem Mord an den europäischen Juden neu erklären: Durch die tägliche Flut an Nachrichten und Pressefotos aus dem NS-Herrschaftsbereich stellte sich eine mediale Saturiertheit ein, die eigene Recherchen nach brisanten Geschichten überflüssig erscheinen ließ.
