## WHAT IS THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE?

THIS CAN HAPPEN THROUGH HARSH SCHOOL DISCIPLINARY MEASURES LIKE SUSPENSIONS, EXPULSIONS, AND ARRESTS ON SCHOOL GROUNDS.

THE PIPELINE IS FUELED BY ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICIES, INADEQUATE MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES, AND RACIAL DISPARITIES THAT DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECT STUDENTS OF COLOR. THESE STUDENTS ARE MORE LIKELY TO FACE PUNITIVE DISCIPLINE RATHER THAN SUPPORTIVE INTERVENTIONS, INCREASING THEIR RISK OF DROPPING OUT AND EVENTUALLY ENTERING THE PRISON SYSTEM.

## SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE STATISTICS 2022: KEY FINDINGS

THE DATA FROM 2022 CONFIRMS THAT THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE REMAINS A SIGNIFICANT ISSUE IN THE UNITED STATES. SEVERAL REPORTS AND RESEARCH STUDIES SHED LIGHT ON THE SCALE AND NUANCES OF THIS PROBLEM.

#### DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS AND RACIAL DISPARITIES

One of the most alarming aspects of the pipeline is the racial disparity in school discipline. According to 2022 statistics:

- BLACK STUDENTS ARE NEARLY 3 TIMES MORE LIKELY TO BE SUSPENDED OR EXPELLED THAN THEIR WHITE PEERS.
- LATINO STUDENTS ALSO FACE DISPROPORTIONATELY HIGHER SUSPENSION RATES COMPARED TO WHITE STUDENTS.
- STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES EXPERIENCE DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS AT RATES HIGHER THAN THE GENERAL STUDENT POPULATION, OFTEN WITHOUT ADEQUATE ACCOMMODATIONS.

THESE DISPARITIES CONTRIBUTE DIRECTLY TO THE PIPELINE, AS STUDENTS WHO ARE SUSPENDED OR EXPELLED MISS OUT ON CRUCIAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AND MAY BECOME DISENGAGED FROM SCHOOL ALTOGETHER.

#### SCHOOL-BASED ARRESTS AND REFERRALS TO LAW ENFORCEMENT

THE INVOLVEMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT IN SCHOOLS HAS BEEN A KEY DRIVER OF THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE. IN 2022:

- There were over 200,000 school-based arrests nationwide.

- Students of color represented a disproportionate share of these arrests, with Black students accounting for nearly 40% despite being a smaller percentage of the overall student body.
- MINOR INFRACTIONS SUCH AS DISORDERLY CONDUCT OR CLASSROOM DISRUPTIONS OFTEN LED TO ARRESTS, INDICATING A CRIMINALIZATION OF TYPICAL ADOLESCENT BEHAVIOR.

THIS CRIMINALIZATION NOT ONLY AFFECTS STUDENTS' ACADEMIC TRAJECTORIES BUT ALSO THEIR LONG-TERM INTERACTIONS WITH THE JUSTICE SYSTEM.

## IMPACT ON GRADUATION RATES AND JUVENILE JUSTICE

THE PIPELINE'S CONSEQUENCES ARE FAR-REACHING. DATA FROM 2022 INDICATES:

- STUDENTS WHO EXPERIENCE SUSPENSION OR EXPULSION ARE 10 TIMES MORE LIKELY TO DROP OUT OF SCHOOL.
- DROPOUT RATES AMONG STUDENTS INVOLVED IN THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM REMAIN SIGNIFICANTLY HIGHER THAN THE NATIONAL AVERAGE.
- EARLY INVOLVEMENT IN THE JUSTICE SYSTEM CORRELATES STRONGLY WITH ADULT INCARCERATION RATES.

THESE STATISTICS SHOW THAT THE PIPELINE DOESN'T JUST INTERRUPT EDUCATION; IT CAN ALTER LIFE TRAJECTORIES, REDUCING ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES AND INCREASING THE LIKELIHOOD OF FUTURE INCARCERATION.

## FACTORS CONTRIBUTING TO THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE

Understanding why the pipeline persists requires looking at root causes and systemic factors.

#### ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICIES

Many schools have adopted zero-tolerance policies that mandate strict punishments for infractions without considering context or intent. While meant to maintain safety, these policies often lead to harsh consequences for minor misbehavior. In 2022, schools with rigid disciplinary codes showed higher rates of suspensions and expulsions, especially among minority students.

#### LACK OF MENTAL HEALTH AND BEHAVIORAL SUPPORTS

STUDENTS STRUGGLING WITH BEHAVIORAL OR EMOTIONAL ISSUES FREQUENTLY DO NOT RECEIVE ADEQUATE SUPPORT.
WITHOUT ACCESS TO COUNSELING OR INTERVENTION PROGRAMS, BEHAVIORS THAT MIGHT BE ADDRESSED THERAPEUTICALLY
INSTEAD RESULT IN PUNISHMENT. THIS GAP IN SUPPORT INCREASES THE CHANCES OF STUDENTS BEING PUSHED OUT OF SCHOOL.

## SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS (SROS) AND POLICING IN SCHOOLS

The presence of law enforcement officers in schools has grown over the past decades. While intended to improve safety, research and 2022 data suggest that SROs contribute to higher arrest rates for non-violent disciplinary issues. Schools with SROs saw a marked increase in referrals to law enforcement compared to those without.

## Breaking Down the Numbers: Regional and Demographic Variations

THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE DOES NOT AFFECT ALL AREAS OR POPULATIONS EQUALLY. REGIONAL DIFFERENCES AND COMMUNITY RESOURCES PLAY SIGNIFICANT ROLES.

#### URBAN VS. RURAL SCHOOLS

Urban schools tend to have higher suspension and arrest rates, partly due to larger student populations and more prevalent law enforcement presence. However, some rural schools face challenges related to limited access to mental health services, which can also contribute to disciplinary issues.

#### GENDER DIFFERENCES IN DISCIPLINE

Boys are more frequently disciplined and arrested in school settings than girls. In 2022, boys accounted for approximately 70% of school-based arrests. However, girls, particularly girls of color, face unique challenges, including higher rates of exclusionary discipline for subjective offenses like "defiance."

#### STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES CONTINUE TO BE VULNERABLE WITHIN DISCIPLINARY SYSTEMS. DESPITE LEGAL PROTECTIONS, MANY ARE DISCIPLINED AT HIGHER RATES THAN THEIR PEERS, OFTEN WITHOUT APPROPRIATE BEHAVIORAL SUPPORTS. THIS INCREASES THEIR RISK OF INVOLVEMENT IN THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM.

## EFFORTS AND STRATEGIES TO ADDRESS THE PIPELINE IN 2022

AMID THE CONCERNING STATISTICS, MANY SCHOOLS, DISTRICTS, AND ORGANIZATIONS ARE ACTIVELY WORKING TO DISRUPT THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE.

## RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PRACTICES

RESTORATIVE JUSTICE FOCUSES ON REPAIRING HARM AND FOSTERING UNDERSTANDING RATHER THAN PUNISHMENT. SCHOOLS IMPLEMENTING THESE PRACTICES HAVE REPORTED REDUCTIONS IN SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS, IMPROVED STUDENT RELATIONSHIPS, AND LOWER RATES OF REPEAT MISBEHAVIOR.

#### POLICY REFORMS AND LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS

SEVERAL STATES INTRODUCED OR PASSED LEGISLATION IN 2022 AIMED AT LIMITING THE USE OF EXCLUSIONARY DISCIPLINE AND REDUCING THE INVOLVEMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT IN SCHOOLS. THESE REFORMS PRIORITIZE KEEPING STUDENTS IN SCHOOL AND ADDRESSING BEHAVIORAL ISSUES THROUGH SUPPORT RATHER THAN CRIMINALIZATION.

### INCREASED MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORTS

RECOGNIZING THE CONNECTION BETWEEN BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AND DISCIPLINE, MANY DISTRICTS HAVE EXPANDED ACCESS TO

COUNSELORS, SOCIAL WORKERS, AND MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS. EARLY INTERVENTION CAN HELP ADDRESS UNDERLYING ISSUES BEFORE THEY RESULT IN DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS.

## WHAT CAN EDUCATORS AND COMMUNITIES DO?

ADDRESSING THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE REQUIRES A COLLABORATIVE APPROACH. EDUCATORS, PARENTS, POLICYMAKERS, AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS ALL HAVE ROLES TO PLAY.

- \*\*Promote equitable discipline policies:\*\* Schools should review disciplinary data regularly to identify and correct disparities
- \*\* INVEST IN SUPPORTIVE SERVICES: \*\* EXPANDING COUNSELING AND MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES CAN PREVENT BEHAVIORAL ISSUES FROM ESCALATING.
- \*\*Train staff on bias and trauma-informed practices: \*\* Educators equipped to understand student backgrounds and trauma can respond more effectively to behavioral challenges.
- \*\*ENGAGE STUDENTS AND FAMILIES:\*\* CREATING INCLUSIVE ENVIRONMENTS WHERE STUDENTS FEEL HEARD AND SUPPORTED REDUCES CONFLICT.
- \*\*LIMIT LAW ENFORCEMENT INVOLVEMENT:\*\* SCHOOLS CAN RECONSIDER THE ROLE OF SROS AND FOCUS ON ALTERNATIVE SAFETY MEASURES.

BY IMPLEMENTING THESE STRATEGIES, COMMUNITIES CAN WORK TOWARD DISMANTLING THE PIPELINE AND ENSURING THAT SCHOOLS REMAIN PLACES OF LEARNING AND GROWTH.

The school to prison pipeline statistics in 2022 remind us that while progress has been made, significant work remains to ensure all students have the opportunity to succeed without being funneled into the justice system. Understanding these trends helps inform better policies and practices that prioritize education and equity over punishment.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

#### WHAT IS THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE?

THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE REFERS TO POLICIES AND PRACTICES THAT PUSH STUDENTS, PARTICULARLY MARGINALIZED YOUTH, FROM THE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM INTO THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM.

#### WHAT WERE THE KEY STATISTICS ABOUT THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE IN 2022?

In 2022, data showed that students of color faced higher rates of suspensions and expulsions, contributing to disproportionate referrals to law enforcement and increased risk of incarceration compared to their white peers.

#### HOW MANY STUDENTS WERE AFFECTED BY THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE IN 2022?

APPROXIMATELY HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF STUDENTS NATIONWIDE EXPERIENCED EXCLUSIONARY DISCIPLINE MEASURES, SUCH AS SUSPENSIONS OR EXPULSIONS, WHICH ARE LINKED TO INCREASED CHANCES OF INVOLVEMENT WITH THE JUVENILE AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEMS.

# WHICH STUDENT GROUPS ARE MOST IMPACTED BY THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE ACCORDING TO 2022 DATA?

BLACK AND HISPANIC STUDENTS, STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES, AND LGBTQ+ YOUTH WERE DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECTED BY DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS LEADING TO THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE IN 2022.

## What role do school resource officers (SROs) play in the school-toprison pipeline in 2022?

In 2022, schools with higher numbers of SROs reported increased referrals to law enforcement for minor infractions, which contributed to the school-to-prison pipeline by criminalizing student behavior.

# DID SUSPENSION RATES CHANGE IN 2022 IN RELATION TO THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE?

Suspension rates remained high in 2022, especially among minority students, perpetuating the cycle of exclusion from education and increasing the likelihood of penal system involvement.

# WHAT IMPACT DID COVID-19 HAVE ON SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE STATISTICS IN 2022?

The pandemic exacerbated existing disparities by increasing disciplinary actions upon return to in-person schooling in 2022, as students struggled with academic and behavioral challenges.

## ARE THERE ANY IMPROVEMENTS NOTED IN 2022 STATISTICS REGARDING THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE?

Some states reported reductions in exclusionary discipline and increased implementation of restorative justice practices in 2022, signaling efforts to dismantle the school-to-prison pipeline.

# HOW DO ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICIES RELATE TO 2022 SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE DATA?

ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICIES CONTINUED TO CONTRIBUTE TO HARSH DISCIPLINARY MEASURES IN 2022, DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECTING MARGINALIZED STUDENTS AND FUELING THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE.

# WHAT MEASURES WERE RECOMMENDED IN 2022 TO ADDRESS THE SCHOOL-TO-PRISON PIPELINE?

RECOMMENDATIONS IN 2022 INCLUDED INCREASING MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT, IMPLEMENTING RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PROGRAMS, REDUCING RELIANCE ON LAW ENFORCEMENT IN SCHOOLS, AND TRAINING STAFF ON IMPLICIT BIAS TO REDUCE DISPARITIES.

## UNDERSTANDING THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE

THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE IS A COMPLEX NETWORK OF POLICIES, PRACTICES, AND INSTITUTIONAL BEHAVIORS THAT

DISPROPORTIONATELY IMPACT STUDENTS OF COLOR, STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES, AND THOSE FROM LOW-INCOME BACKGROUNDS. THE PIPELINE OFTEN BEGINS WITH HARSH SCHOOL DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS, SUCH AS SUSPENSIONS, EXPULSIONS, AND ARRESTS FOR MINOR INFRACTIONS, WHICH INCREASE THE LIKELIHOOD OF FUTURE INCARCERATION. THE 2022 STATISTICS SHED LIGHT ON THE EXTENT TO WHICH ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICIES, THE PRESENCE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT IN SCHOOLS, AND DISPARITIES IN DISCIPLINARY MEASURES CONTRIBUTE TO THIS CYCLE.

#### KEY SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE STATISTICS IN 2022

RECENT DATA FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION'S OFFICE FOR CIVIL RIGHTS (OCR) AND JUVENILE JUSTICE REPORTS PROVIDE VALUABLE QUANTITATIVE INDICATORS OF THE PIPELINE'S CURRENT STATE:

- DISPROPORTIONATE DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS: BLACK STUDENTS REPRESENTED APPROXIMATELY 15% OF THE STUDENT POPULATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS BUT ACCOUNTED FOR NEARLY 30% OF OUT-OF-SCHOOL SUSPENSIONS IN 2022. THIS DISPARITY HIGHLIGHTS PERSISTENT RACIAL BIAS IN DISCIPLINARY POLICIES.
- INCREASED LAW ENFORCEMENT INVOLVEMENT: IN 2022, ABOUT 70% OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS REPORTED HAVING LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ON CAMPUS. SCHOOLS WITH OFFICERS PRESENT SHOWED HIGHER RATES OF STUDENT ARRESTS FOR NON-VIOLENT OFFENSES, INDICATING A CRIMINALIZATION OF TYPICAL ADOLESCENT BEHAVIOR.
- Students with Disabilities: Students with disabilities made up roughly 14% of the student population but were disproportionately subjected to exclusionary discipline, being suspended or expelled at rates nearly twice that of their peers without disabilities.
- JUVENILE ARREST TRENDS: JUVENILE ARRESTS FOR SCHOOL-BASED INCIDENTS ACCOUNTED FOR NEARLY 20% OF TOTAL JUVENILE ARRESTS IN 2022, UNDERSCORING THE ROLE SCHOOLS PLAY AS ENTRY POINTS INTO THE JUSTICE SYSTEM.

THESE STATISTICS EMPHASIZE THAT DESPITE SOME EFFORTS TO REFORM DISCIPLINARY PRACTICES, SYSTEMIC INEQUALITIES REMAIN DEEPLY EMBEDDED IN SCHOOL ENVIRONMENTS.

## FACTORS CONTRIBUTING TO THE PIPELINE IN 2022

SEVERAL FACTORS IDENTIFIED IN 2022 REINFORCE THE SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE, INCLUDING POLICY FRAMEWORKS, INSTITUTIONAL PRACTICES, AND BROADER SOCIO-ECONOMIC ISSUES.

#### ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICIES AND THEIR IMPACT

Zero-tolerance policies, prevalent throughout the 1990s and early 2000s, continue to influence disciplinary measures. These policies mandate predetermined punishments for specific offenses without regard for individual circumstances. In 2022, schools that maintained strict zero-tolerance approaches exhibited higher suspension and expulsion rates, particularly among minority students. The rigidity of such policies often escalates minor infractions into criminal matters, contributing to higher rates of school-based arrests.

# ROLE OF SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS (SROS)

The presence of School Resource Officers has been a contentious issue. While intended to enhance safety, data from 2022 show that schools with SROs have increased referrals to law enforcement for behaviors that traditionally would be managed by school administrators. This shift effectively criminalizes student conduct, particularly among vulnerable populations. Critics argue that this contributes to an adversarial school

#### RACIAL AND SOCIOECONOMIC DISPARITIES

SOCIOECONOMIC STATUS AND RACE REMAIN SIGNIFICANT PREDICTORS OF INVOLVEMENT IN THE PIPELINE. IN 2022, STUDENTS FROM ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED BACKGROUNDS EXPERIENCED HIGHER RATES OF DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS AND WERE MORE LIKELY TO ATTEND SCHOOLS WITH LIMITED RESOURCES FOR BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTIONS. RACIAL DISPARITIES ALSO PERSISTED, WITH BLACK AND LATINO STUDENTS FACING HARSHER PUNISHMENT FOR COMPARABLE BEHAVIORS RELATIVE TO THEIR WHITE PEERS.

### POLICY RESPONSES AND REFORM EFFORTS IN 2022

Amid the concerning statistics, 2022 saw increased advocacy and policy initiatives aimed at dismantling the school to prison pipeline.

## RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PRACTICES

SEVERAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS EXPANDED RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PROGRAMS, FOCUSING ON MEDIATION AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION RATHER THAN PUNITIVE DISCIPLINE. EARLY DATA INDICATE THAT SCHOOLS IMPLEMENTING THESE APPROACHES SAW REDUCTIONS IN SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS, CONTRIBUTING TO LESS INVOLVEMENT WITH THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM.

#### LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS

AT THE FEDERAL AND STATE LEVELS, LAWMAKERS INTRODUCED BILLS AIMED AT LIMITING THE USE OF EXCLUSIONARY DISCIPLINE AND RESTRICTING LAW ENFORCEMENT PRESENCE IN SCHOOLS. FOR EXAMPLE, SOME STATES ENACTED LEGISLATION REQUIRING TRAINING FOR SCHOOL PERSONNEL ON IMPLICIT BIAS AND TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES, DESIGNED TO REDUCE DISPROPORTIONATE DISCIPLINARY OUTCOMES.

## **EQUITY-FOCUSED INTERVENTIONS**

TARGETED INTERVENTIONS ADDRESSING THE NEEDS OF STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES AND MARGINALIZED RACIAL GROUPS GAINED TRACTION. PROGRAMS FOCUSING ON MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT, CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE TEACHING, AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT BECAME MORE WIDESPREAD, REFLECTING A HOLISTIC APPROACH TO REDUCING PIPELINE RISKS.

# CHALLENGES AND AREAS FOR FURTHER RESEARCH

- DATA GAPS: COMPREHENSIVE NATIONAL DATA ON SCHOOL DISCIPLINE AND JUVENILE JUSTICE INVOLVEMENT ARE OFTEN FRAGMENTED, LIMITING THE ABILITY TO TRACK LONG-TERM TRENDS AND THE EFFECTIVENESS OF REFORMS.
- **RESISTANCE TO CHANGE:** Some school districts resist moving away from traditional disciplinary approaches, citing concerns over safety and order.

• **RESOURCE LIMITATIONS:** Many schools lack the funding and trained personnel necessary to implement alternative disciplinary models effectively.

By focusing on the stories of people whose pain and pharmaceutical treatment led to incarceration, Smirnova challenges the binary of individual and social problems, effectively exploring how the conceptualization, diagnosis, and treatment of substance use may exacerbate outcomes such as relapse, recidivism, poverty, abuse, and death.
