From this perspective the voices being empowered in this book are clear examples of the importance of protest by women in forcing a totalitarian regime to pause and reconsider its options for the moment. In revealing so, *Women Defying Hitler* ultimately foregrounds that women rescuers and resisters were and are of great continuing consequence.
