The overall hypothesis was that by engaging in the intervention (webinars, masterclasses, or podcast series) healthcare professionals who participated in the intervention would have an increased understanding of educator roles, willingness to apply, and likelihood of flourishing in these roles. The evaluation was structured into three research phases: establishing a baseline, assessing the delivery process, and analysing the intervention's impact. 57 healthcare professionals participated in the fieldwork by answering pre-intervention and post-intervention questionnaires, and four of them also completed in-depth interviews. This eBook presented the findings from all three phases and highlighted the project's effectiveness in raising awareness, improving confidence, and inspiring participation in educator roles within healthcare.
