# EXPLORING THE MUSICAL STYLES REPRESENTED BY THE GULF COAST BANJO SOCIETY

### BLUEGRASS AND OLD-TIME TRADITIONS

## CAJUN AND ZYDECO INFLUENCES

GIVEN THE GULF COAST'S PROXIMITY TO LOUISIANA, THE SOCIETY ALSO CELEBRATES CAJUN AND ZYDECO MUSIC. WHILE THE ACCORDION AND FIDDLE DOMINATE THESE GENRES, THE BANJO ADDS A SHARP, RHYTHMIC DRIVE THAT COMPLEMENTS THE VIBRANT DANCE TUNES. THIS FUSION IS A HIGHLIGHT FOR MANY MEMBERS, SHOWCASING THE BANJO'S ADAPTABILITY.

#### BLUES AND FOLK BANJO

THE BANJO'S ROOTS TRACE BACK TO AFRICAN INSTRUMENTS, MAKING IT A NATURAL FIT FOR BLUES MUSIC. THE GULF COAST BANJO SOCIETY OFTEN EXPLORES BLUES BANJO STYLES, WHICH EMPHASIZE SOULFUL, RHYTHMIC PLAYING. Research on African music reveals a highly developed tradition in West Africa, which dates to the eleventh or twelfth century and continues today. From these West African roots, fiddling was prominent in many African American communities between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries, and the fiddle became an important instrument in early twentieth-century blues, jazz, and jug bands. While less common in late twentieth-century African American jazz and popular music groups, the fiddle remained integral to the musicking of some Black musicians in the rural South.
