This resulted in widespread demonstrations against it, massacres took place in Russian-speaking cities, Crimea seceded, and Donetsk and Luhansk declared themselves autonomous republics. The government declared the demonstrators terrorists and bombed its eastern regions for 8 years. When president Zelensky decided to subdue the Donbass by military force, the two Donbass republics requested Russia's help, and on 24 February, 2022 Russian troops entered the Donbass. This was the beginning of the SMO, Russia's Special Military Operation, to protect Ukraine's Russian-speaking population against the civil war waged against them by their own government since 2014. Media reporting on the conflict was and is highly biased and selective, presenting an image often at odds with facts and crucial details needed to understand what is happening and why. This book tries to complete the picture.
