How can you ensure the sale? The most effective way to gain someone's trust and motivate them to buy from you or join your team is to carefully enter the conversation already happening in their mind. By doing so, you help your prospect see the value of your service through the information you provide, leading them to recognize their need for what you offer. I once heard a quote that says, People don't like to be sold to, but they pretend to buy. Numerous sales skills and manipulation techniques exist for building trust with potential customers superficially. However, the most powerful way to influence and persuade is by understanding their thoughts, feelings, desires, and the problems they seek to solve, particularly in your area of expertise. Unless you possess mind-reading abilities, the best approach is to ask open-ended, empowering questions. This helps build rapport and engages in meaningful discussion to guide them toward the desired outcome, linking their needs with the benefits and features of your product, service, and your why.
