Richard LaGravenese, slighted by critic Gene Siskel over his screenplay for *The Fisher King* (1991) wrote an unsavory character named Siskel into *The Ref* (1994). Movies and television shows often feature inside jokes. Sometimes there are characters named after crew members. Directors are often featured in cameo appearances--Alfred Hitchcock's silhouette can be seen in *Family Plot* (1976), for example. This work catalogs such occurrences. Each entry includes the title of the film or show, year of release, and a full description of the in-joke.

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
