Several days into the voyage, Ahab finally appears as a man seemingly made of bronze who stands on an ivory leg fashioned from whalebone. He eventually gets into a violent argument with Stubb when the second mate makes a joke at Ahab's expense, and kicks him. This leads Stubb to dream of kicking Ahab's ivory leg off, but Flask claims that the kick from Ahab is a sign of honor. At last, Ahab tells the crew of the Pequod to look for a white-headed whale with a wrinkled brow: Moby Dick, the legendary whale that took Ahab's leg. Starbuck tells Ahab that his obsession with Moby Dick is madness, but Ahab claims that all things are masks and there is some unknown reasoning behind that mask that man must strike through. For Ahab, Moby Dick is that mask. Ahab himself seems to recognize his own madness. Starbuck begins to worry that the ship is overmatched by the mad captain and knows that he will see an impious end to Ahab. While Queequeg and Ishmael weave a sword-mat for lashing to their boat, the Pequod soon comes upon a whale and Ahab orders his crew to their boats. Serving on a whaler in 1842, he jumped ship and spent a month living among South Pacific islanders. His first novel, Typee (1846), a bestseller, was based in part on his experiences in the South Pacific as was the successful sequel, Omoo (1847). The same year Melville, now a successful novelist, married Elizabeth Knapp Shaw. They would have four children between 1849 and 1855. Mardi and Redburn, both published in 1849, met with limited success. Mardi in particular was criticized as so thematically dense as to be incomprehensible. White-Jacket (1850), based on Melville's brief service in the U.S. Navy, was his most influential work during his lifetime, with graphic descriptions of flogging that led directly to banning the practice on naval vessels. Moby Dick and several additional failed novels and poetry collections followed. Melville sank into obscurity and died in 1891, about 20 years before Moby Dick was recognized as a literary classic.

HERMAN MELVILLE Herman Melville (August 1, 1819 - September 28, 1891) was an American novelist, a news writer, and a poet of the American Renaissance period. His best-known works include *Typee* (1846), a romantic account of his experiences in Polynesian life, and his whaling novel *Moby-Dick* (1851). His work has been almost forgotten in his last 30 years. His writing is based on his experience at sea as a common sailor, the exploration of literature and philosophy, and the engagement in the contradictions of American society in a period of rapid change. He developed a complex Baroque style; the vocabulary is rich and original, a strong sense of rhythm permeates the elaborate sentences, the imagery is often mystical or ironic, and the abundance of allusions extends to biblical writing, to myth, to philosophy, to literature and the visual arts. Melville was born in New York, the third child of a dry French merchant. His formal education ended abruptly after his father's death in 1832, leaving the family in a difficult financial situation. He briefly became a teacher before sinking in 1839 as a seaman on a merchant ship. In 1840, he signed aboard the whaler *Acushnet* on his first whaling trip, but jumped ship in the Marquesas Islands. He returned to Boston in 1844 after other adventures. His first book was *Typee* (1846), a highly romanticized account of his life among the Polynesians. He became such a bestseller that he wrote the *Omoo Suite* (1847). These successes encouraged her to marry Elizabeth Shaw, daughter of a prominent Boston family, but success was hard to maintain. His first novel that was not based on his own experiences was *Tuesday* (1849), a tale of the sea that develops into a philosophical allegory - but it was not well received.

Melville began writing *Moby-Dick* in February 1850, and finished 18 months later, a year longer than he had anticipated. Melville drew on his experience as a common sailor from 1841 to 1844, including several years on whalers, and on wide reading in whaling literature. The white whale is modeled on the notoriously hard-to-catch albino whale Mocha Dick, and the book's ending is based on the sinking of the whaleship *Essex* in 1820. His literary influences include Shakespeare and the Bible. The detailed and realistic descriptions of whale hunting and of extracting whale oil, as well as life aboard ship among a culturally diverse crew, are mixed with exploration of class and social status, good and evil, and the existence of God. In addition to narrative prose, Melville uses styles and literary devices ranging from songs, poetry, and catalogs to Shakespearean stage directions, soliloquies, and asides. In August 1850, with the manuscript perhaps half finished, he met Nathaniel Hawthorne and was deeply moved by his *Mosses from an Old Manse*, which he compared to Shakespeare in its cosmic ambitions. This encounter may have inspired him to revise and expand *Moby-Dick*, which is dedicated to Hawthorne, in token of my admiration for his genius.
