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janie crawford character analysis: *Sweat* Zora Neale Hurston, 1997 Now frequently anthologized, Zora Neale Hurston's short story *Sweat* was first published in *Fireell*, a legendary literary magazine of the Harlem Renaissance, whose sole issue appeared in November 1926. Among contributions by Gwendolyn Bennett, Countee Cullen, Langston Hughes, and Wallace Thurman, *Sweat* stood out both for its artistic accomplishment and its exploration of rural Southern black life.
