COMPARATIVELY, *PARABLE OF THE SOWER* SHARES THEMATIC KINSHIP WITH MARGARET ATWOOD'S *THE HANDMAID'S TALE*

AND CORMAC MCCARTHY'S *THE ROAD*, BOTH OF WHICH EXPLORE SOCIETAL COLLAPSE AND SURVIVAL. HOWEVER, BUTLER'S EMPHASIS ON SPIRITUALITY, COMMUNITY-BUILDING, AND THE POSSIBILITY OF RENEWAL SETS HER WORK APART.

THE NOVEL'S SEQUEL, *PARABLE OF THE TALENTS*, CONTINUES TO EXPAND ON THESE THEMES, EXPLORING THE CHALLENGES OF SUSTAINING EARTHSEED'S IDEALS AMID POLITICAL UPHEAVAL. TOGETHER, THE TWO NOVELS OFFER A ROBUST EXAMINATION OF HOPE AND RESISTANCE IN DYSTOPIAN CONTEXTS.
